Project Objectives

The EU4ClimateResilience project supports Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine in moving towards a low-carbon and climate-resilient future, in line with the objectives of the European Green Deal. It helps governments improve their climate policies and actions in line with the Paris Agreement and their commitments with the European Union. This includes support for updating national climate targets, strengthening systems to track emissions and progress, and integrating climate considerations into key sectors such as energy, transport and urban development.

The project also works at the local level, supporting cities in implementing practical measures to better prepare for and respond to climate risks. At the same time, it promotes sustainable finance by helping to develop frameworks and tools, such as green bonds, to attract investment in climate-friendly projects.

Project Approach

The project follows a country- and context-specific, demand-driven approach, allowing flexibility to respond to evolving national priorities and needs. It leverages its regional dimension to foster peer learning and coordinated support across Eastern Partnership countries.

Key Implementation Areas in Armenia

MRV System Improvement

- Improvement of the MRV System: Establishment and operation of an electronic database for greenhouse gas emissions inventory (GHG Registry) and its official presentation by the Ministry of Environment.
- Training on data entry and system administration for the MRV platform for governmental officials.



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Climate Adaptation

- Support the implementation of the Sustainable Energy and Climate Action Plans (SECAPs) for Akunk, Talin and Aparan communities.
- Support the development of Armenia's Second National Adaptation Plan and the draft Government Decree on the 2026–2030 Action Plan of the National Adaptation Plan (NAP).
- Carbon Tax Impact Assessment for Armenia.

Capacity Development

- Improvement of climate negotiation skills for the Armenian Party Delegates at CBD COP17 and UNFCCC COP31.
- Implementation of the COP17 Media School for Journalists.
