Project Objectives

The EU4ClimateResilience project supports Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine in moving towards a low-carbon and climate-resilient future, in line with the objectives of the European Green Deal. It helps governments improve their climate policies and actions in line with the Paris Agreement and their commitments with the European Union. This includes support for updating national climate targets, strengthening systems to track emissions and progress, and integrating climate considerations into key sectors such as energy, transport and urban development.

The project also works at the local level, supporting cities in implementing practical measures to better prepare for and respond to climate risks. At the same time, it promotes sustainable finance by helping to develop frameworks and tools, such as green bonds, to attract investment in climate-friendly projects.

Project Approach

The project follows a country- and context-specific, demand-driven approach, allowing flexibility to respond to evolving national priorities and needs. It leverages its regional dimension to foster peer learning and coordinated support across Eastern Partnership countries.

Climate Policy and Governance

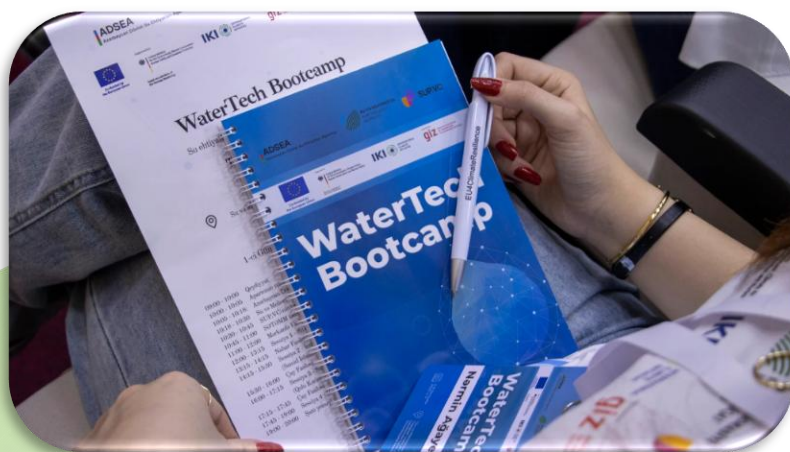
- Support the development of Azerbaijan's Climate Law/Code through policy, legal and institutional assessments.
- Develop policy recommendations to support climate policy implementation and institutional coordination.

Climate Adaptation

- Support the development of Regional Adaptation Plans for the Baku and Shirvan-Salyan Economic Districts.
- Support municipalities in developing Sustainable Energy and Climate Action Plans (SECAPs), including the integration of climate adaptation measures.
- Support climate-resilient water resources planning through adaptation planning and technical assessments.

Capacity Development and Knowledge Exchange

- Deliver specialised capacity-building programmes for national institutions, municipalities and academia.
- Strengthen capacities on climate adaptation, water security, integrated water resources management (IWRM), and climate-resilient water resources management.
- Promote knowledge exchange and stakeholder engagement through technical workshops, study visits and awareness-raising activities.
